## WEEKLY SAFETY SNAPSHOT

This week's public safety picture is defined by layered risk. Retail crime remains a frontline safety issue, fraud and cyber-enabled crime continue to expand across Europe, knife crime policy is focusing on prevention and access to weapons, domestic abuse remains heavily under-recognised, and Europol's terrorism reporting reminds leaders that extremist risk is increasingly connected to online ecosystems. **The repeated lesson is early recognition: by the time danger looks obvious, the safest options may already be reduced.**

**UK & EU INTELLIGENCE VIEW****RETAIL CRIME LAW****New**

UK retail crime measures include a standalone offence for assaulting a retail worker and changes around low-value shop theft.

**FRAUD PRESSURE****EU-wide**

Europol's IOCTA 2026 identifies online fraud schemes as one of the fastest-growing areas of organised crime.

**DOMESTIC ABUSE****High**

Ireland reported a rise in domestic abuse incidents, with more than 1,000 incidents per week being highlighted.

**TERRORISM PICTURE****EU**

Europol's TE-SAT 2026 provides updated European terrorism and violent extremism trend analysis.

**Community pressure point**

Public safety now relies on recognising patterns across physical, digital and behavioural spaces.

**Frontline worker pressure point**

Retail crime is not just theft — it includes abuse, repeat offending and violence risk.

**Digital pressure point**

Fraud, cybercrime and online grooming increasingly cross borders faster than local systems can respond.

## 🛒 RETAIL CRIME, SHOPLIFTING AND FRONTLINE WORKER PROTECTION

### 1. RETAIL CRIME: SHOPLIFTING IS NOW A PUBLIC SAFETY ISSUE

This week, UK retail crime remained a major public safety concern, with new legal measures designed to protect shop workers and challenge the perception that low-value shop theft is not taken seriously.

The key lesson is simple: shoplifting is not only about stolen goods. It is about intimidation, repeat offending, staff safety, community confidence and how quickly small incidents can become violent.

### 2. FRAUD & CYBERCRIME: EUROPE'S FASTEST-MOVING SAFETY PROBLEM

Europol's 2026 cybercrime reporting highlights how online fraud, cyber-attacks, encryption abuse, proxy infrastructure and AI enabled tactics are reshaping public safety.

The public lesson is blunt: a scam is not "just online". It can affect money, identity, confidence, mental health, businesses and national resilience.

## 🔪 KNIFE CRIME, WEAPONS ACCESS AND YOUTH PREVENTION

### 3. KNIFE CRIME: PREVENTION STARTS BEFORE THE WEAPON APPEARS

UK knife-crime policy remains focused on hotspot policing, school support, weapon access, online sales and earlier intervention.

The main safety point is that serious knife incidents rarely begin at the moment the knife appears. They often build through fear, conflict, peer pressure, routes, online threats and access to weapons.

## 4. DOMESTIC ABUSE: HARM OFTEN HAPPENS IN PLAIN SIGHT

Domestic abuse remained a major concern this week, with Ireland reporting a rise in incidents and public warnings around abuse that can occur hidden in plain sight.

The key learning is that domestic abuse risk is not only physical violence. It may include coercive control, intimidation, forced entry, stalking, threats, isolation, monitoring and post-separation escalation.

## 5. EU TERRORISM PICTURE: ONLINE ECOSYSTEMS STILL MATTER

Europol published its EU Terrorism Situation and Trend Report 2026 this week, giving an updated situational picture of terrorism and violent extremism across the EU.

The key public lesson is that terrorism and extremism are not only about an attack. They are also about radicalisation, propaganda, grievance, online communities and early behavioural change.

The key lesson is not political. It is practical: crowded public spaces can shift quickly when emotion, counter-groups, transport disruption and police pressure overlap.
